Nancy Lombardo





Update on American Fork Vandalism

The Forest Service went down to the site this morning with Claire Dean, who is the rock art conservator. She did an assessment and is going to write up her report. She said it will be very difficult. The dots on the panel are lipstick that is still globbed on there and is greasy on the porous limestone. All the other markings are made with paint pens.

I was hoping that our month of rain might have dull things a bit, but it made no affect whatsoever on the graffiti. She also said the difficulty is, although it's all paint pens, the different colors can react in different ways depending on the solvent we are trying to use to remove it. It is likely that not all of it can be removed, and there will at least be a shadow of much of it, although it will look a lot better than it does now.

We're going to do some preliminary tests on the effectiveness of different strategies. Once we figure out the best way to proceed. SHPO Will likely contract with her to do the conservation work.

Fox 13 had a camera guy on site today, and Ian Wright, the new public archaeologist, is going to see if he can make contact with some of the schools in the area. Hopefully if we could figure out who did it, they can put some money towards the conservation work, because it's not gonna be cheap.

Junior Shovel Bums in Action John McHugh

While Blessed Sacrament School's "Shovel Bums" (5th through 8th grade) were in the classroom and field performing research, documentation, and stewardship of prehistoric Native American rock art their younger colleagues were learning the rudiments of archaeology in the classroom. In fact, so many students were interested in Native American culture and rock art that it necessitated the formation of the "Junior Shovel Bums" archaeology club for 3rd and 4th graders too young to go in the field like their older peers.

Under the guidance of tutelage of the Shovel Bums' room mother, Alexa Hansen, and Blessed Sacrament Resource teacher, Reagen Ford, the Junior Shovel Bums archaeology club was forged. These 8 through 10 year-olds learn the rudiments of archaeology, especially jargon words like artifact, stratigraphy, gridding, rock art (which is now more often being called rock imagery) and other similar concepts. Each class had an associated lesson and activity, the final lessons concluding during the first part of October.

The Junior Shovel Bums will become full-fledged Shovel Bums in 5th through 8th grade, and will then go into the field to steward, protect, and study the magnificent Native American rock art of Utah.
